## MEMORIAL

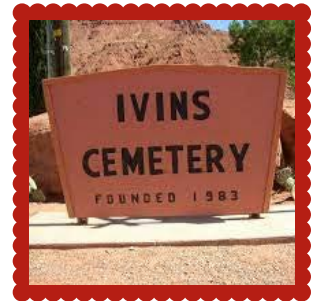
Having recently celebrated Memorial Day, I'd like to inform you of an effort underway to place a Veteran's Memorial Monument in the Ivins Cemetery. The idea was presented to the City Council earlier this year by Laela Gaylord who, with the help of Tiffany Martineau and others, is the prime mover on the project. The Council agreed to make space available on the north end of the cemetery and local architect Steve Corry has volunteered his time and expertise to design the memorial. His concept plan was presented to the Council recently and was approved. It is a stunning tribute to Veterans from all branches of the military that will fit beautifully in the allocated long narrow space above the northernmost drive with our Big Red Mountain in the background. As presently planned the name of every Ivins Veteran will be engraved on one of a series of stone monuments representing the various branches of service.

Laela has taken on a monumental task in putting this project together. Beyond getting it designed and approved it also involves raising the money to build it. At present the plan is to offer engraved bricks that will be placed at the base of the monuments that could bear the name of the donor or another short statement. We will publish information in future newsletters as it becomes available and I hope you'll want to participate. A big thank you goes out to Laela and her team from all of us.

While I'm on the topic of the cemetery, burial plots have sold rapidly over the last few years forcing the development of another large section that is still in process. It will be very different from the existing traditional grass covered sections. Under the Council's direction, in order to conserve water Benny Sorensen and his Parks Supervisor Joseph Rawlinson have conceived, designed and are developing the new grassless section that's unlike anything I've seen. With its tree lined walkways complete with meditation benches it is far more inviting than one might guess. I think it will become a pattern for future cemetery development in the desert southwest. Burial and Cremation plots are available and are already selling in this newly developed area.

Only enough land remains available at the current Ivins Cemetery site for another section or two to be developed before we will run out of room. Anticipating that day, Ivins City is in the process of acquiring eighty acres of BLM land south of Old Highway 91 under a "Recreation and Public Purposes" (R&PP) grant. A section of that land is intended to be used for a second cemetery. The terrain is rocky and sloped so it will take a lot of fill material and hard work to make it usable for that purpose, but it is a beautiful setting and in the years ahead I think it will be a desirable place for a cemetery. No doubt Benny and his staff will employ all the good ideas they're using in the new section they're working on now to create both a beautiful and water wise future cemetery that will fill the future needs of the city through buildout.

We see evidence of the good work of our Parks and Recreation Staff all around us. It certainly shows in our well maintained parks and streetscaping But the artistry and thoughtfulness they exhibit on the projects that are delegated to them is remarkable. From Fire Lake Park to improvements at the Ivins Cemetery to the landscaping around our new City Hall the impressive landscape designs, the beautiful retaining walls and the artistic use of native vegetation requiring little to no water are a real credit to the city.

Even a simple pedestal for a newly installed piece of metal art on the west side of City Hall is done to perfection. What a thrill it was for me to walk around City Hall with CNN Correspondent Bill Weir in a recent interview and have the opportunity to point out that the beautiful Joshua trees that Joseph searched for and obtained at little cost to the city and the other native plants require no irrigation water. In an interview focused on water conservation, that served as a powerful image and example of our commitment as a city to that effort. Thank you Benny & company for all you do to make and keep Ivins City beautiful.

# Ivins City History

*In celebration of the 100 year settlement of Ivins, I am sharing with you some of the stories about the original pioneer families of Ivins. For the next 12 months I will be putting a spotlight on each of the families and their accomplishments. I hope you enjoy reading about them as much as I have. I want to thank Emma Fife who wrote "History of The Santa Clara Bench - Ivins Our Home Beneath the Red Mountain", Kay and Ellen Ence who wrote "Lillie and Milo Ence Pioneer Stalwarts", The Washington County Historical Society, and the website Familysearch.org where I am able to read and learn about all these wonderful pioneers. - Cherise*



**Loren and Fern Stucki** married on October 17, 1923. When Loren and Fern were married, the little town of Ivins had six families living there, when Loren found out he had an opportunity to build a home and receive an acre of property to help build the community he didn't hesitate. It was said that Loren was a very industrious young man and Fern a highly respected lady. Their home was one of the quickest built. In September 1925 he began building their home and by November 30, 1925 Loren and Fern with one son were the tenth family to move into Ivins. Loren was made Constable and he also was employed to help work on Old Highway 91 and other road projects.



One of the many struggles that the original settlers had to deal with constantly were the roads. The road from St. George to California that came right through Santa Clara and Ivins was first known as the Arrowhead Trail. It was used by the early pioneers of Ivins to travel to Santa Clara and St. George, as well as to Utah Hill, then on to the small towns of Littlefield, Arizona, and Mesquite and Bunkerville, Nevada.

When Ivins was first settled, the Arrowhead Trail and other roads consisted of sandy soil. Improving the roads gave work to several men who lived in Ivins and throughout the area. There was a good force of men and teams working. At times there were up to forty men and twenty-three teams that were said to be working. Roads continued to be improved as the men traveled to "road camps" where they would work a

stretch of road throughout the week instead of traveling home each night. Edward Frei Jr. said "Arrowhead Road was a main artery of travel for commercial and pleasure motor transportation between So. California and Utah and it skirted the south end of my field. Sometimes the travelers had to hitch a team of horses to their cars to pull them up the sandy hills."

In 1943 Loren and Fern decided to move back to Santa Clara. Fern passed away in September 1953 and Loren passed away in 1957 following a stroke. They were survived by three children, Cleyon, Gar, and Lorna.



**Rulon and Vera Grace Stucki** with one son moved to Ivins in December 1925, only one month after Loren and Fern moved up to Ivins this made them the eleventh family to make a home here. That is not the only date these couples share. Rulon and Vera Stucki were married on October 18, 1923 just one day after Loren and Fern Stucki. After they moved to Ivins, Vera's Uncle Harvey Staheli stayed and helped them that first year on the farm while Grace was trying to regain her health. Grace had a lot of infection resulting from a stillbirth she had suffered one year prior. Unfortunately that baby was not the only child they would lose. Their oldest son Wayne later enlisted in the army; he lost his life during World War II in 1944. They moved back to Santa Clara, around 1932 and Rulon got a job in Las Vegas. Rulon and Vera later divorced. Rulon passed away in 1978 in Las Vegas, Nevada. Grace stayed in Santa Clara and worked as a supervisor of the school lunch program for Washington County School District, retiring in 1966 after twenty years. Grace passed away in 1983 at the age of eighty two. They were survived by four children Max, Kay, Joan, and Brent.

Even though I was not able to find a lot of specific information about both of these families' lives while living in Ivins, I wanted to pay tribute to their time and sacrifice of being an original pioneer of our town. I have no doubt that they helped cultivate the farms, children, and animals just like all the original families did. Their main goal was to provide a living for their family and I know they were able to accomplish this goal.



Congratulations to two of Vista’s technology teachers, Andrew Egbert and Jordan Bartholomew. for being honored as the Engineering Educators of the Year for grades 7-12 for the Southern Utah Stem awards. They run an incredible Engineering Technology program at Vista School including 3D design, 3D printing, robotics, coding, and other related skills.

Advanced Choir took first place in their division at the Music in the Parks competition in Northern Utah, followed by a day of fun at Lagoon.

Vista School’s VEX Robotics and VEX IQ teams in both elementary and middle school competed in the World Championship in Texas. Several of Vista’s teams placed high in the rankings, including 16th in the world!

End-of-year concerts and other performances were shared nightly during May, along with student awards for Technology and two fun Field Days.

It is our collective responsibility to ensure that our precious waterways remain clean and healthy for generations to come. Every year we cover this important topic in the newsletter since it is vital that we protect this local resource. Nobody wants our washes, rivers, and lakes to be full of trash, oils, and other chemicals. Practically every drop of water that flows off our lots and into our gutters, streets, and storm drain inlets goes directly into washes that go directly into the Santa Clara River totally untreated. Not everybody knows that. Unfortunately, human activities commonly contribute to polluted waterways. In Ivins we have very little industrial waste, but even our local suburbs and agriculture can contribute to the problem. Here are top ways to help:

- Do not overwater your yard. There are so many reasons not to do this, but protecting rivers is a big one. Fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides will run off with excess water. The nutrients from fertilizers cause algae and its deleterious effects to explode. Pesticides and herbicides, even in diluted quantities, are not healthy for the river environment.
- Be litter conscious. Dispose of trash properly, pickup litter when its noticed, and participate in community cleanup initiatives. Consider participating in the Ivins City Adopt-a-block program. Thank you to those that are already participating!
- Proper waste disposal. Household chemicals, batteries, oil, paints, and other hazardous materials should be responsibly disposed of. These do not go into the regular garbage or the sewer. Washington County Landfill holds a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day twice each year, usually in March and September. It's free.



It takes everyone being aware and educated about the dangers posed to our waterways to be successful. Spread the word. Also, it is illegal to dump hazardous chemicals into our drainage system. If you see anyone do this anywhere, call 911 and report it.

## WATER WISDOM

**Help the City reach its goal to reduce water use by 10% over the next 10 years.**

**Outdoor Tip:** Don't water more than three times per week during the summer. It's not allowed to water between 8am and 8pm. **Indoor Tip:** Turn your water off while brushing your teeth or shaving.

## CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

**Highway 91 Project:** The HWY 91 project began early February. To date, construction crews have been working on underground utilities, clearing shoulders, and preparing shoulders for sub grade and base course placement. Work has also begun on clearing and preparing sub grades at the two roundabouts at 400 W. and Kwavasa Dr. There have been several weather delays and changes to the scope of the project that will likely have an impact on the final completion date of the project. Information will be provided as the project gets closer to completion.

The project generally entails resurfacing the roadway, adding a center landscape median, adding bike lanes to HWY 91 from 200 East to Kwavasa, adding a 11' wide pedestrian trail on the north side of HWY 91 from 200 East to Fire Lake Park, and the construction of two roundabouts located at 400 West and Kwavasa. There will also be some utility improvements as well as intersection improvements at 200 West and Main Street. Anticipate mild to moderate disruption along HWY 91 continuing until September. It is anticipated that the roadways and roundabouts will be done in segments. Below are the general segments and the anticipated work timeline:

- Road Segment 1 – 200 East to 400 West – late February to mid June (about 55 days)
  - Road Segment 2 – 400 West Roundabout – mid May to early July (about 40 days)
  - Road Segment 3 – 400 West to Kwavasa – early July to early August (about 30 days)
  - Road Segment 4 – Kwavasa Roundabout – early May to mid June (about 40 days)
- A final asphalt overlay of all road segments, between 200 East and Kwavasa, is anticipated to be done in August.

The trails are also anticipated to be done in segments, below are the general segments and the anticipated work timeline:

- Trail Segment 1 – 200 East to Main Street – early April to early June (20 days)
- Trail Segment 2 – Main Street to 400 West – late April to late June (30 days)
- Trail Segment 3 – 400 West Roundabout – late April to early July (35 days)
- Trail Segment 4 – 400 West to Kwavasa – late May to late July (30 days)
- Trail Segment 5 – Kwavasa to Kayenta Parkway – late June to late August (50 days)
- Trail Segment 6 – Kayenta Parkway to Fire Lake Park – early June to early August (40 days)

This schedule is tentative and subject to change, but more accurate information will be provided each month as the project progresses.

**400 East Storm Drain:** A new storm drain system is being constructed on 400 East from 600 S to 800 S. The project started on May 8th. The storm drain will be installed down the centerline of the roadway, which will limit the amount of pavement available for traffic. Traffic control has been set up in a one-way configuration, from south to north. Anticipate that this configuration will remain through the duration of the construction period. It is anticipated that the construction will take approximately 60 days. Please anticipate moderate traffic disruption, delays, and detours.

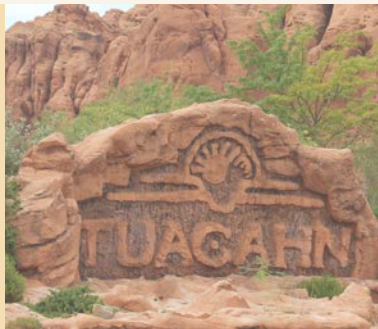

## COYOTE TALES

On March 24th eight storytellers took the stage at The Center for the Arts at Kayenta for the first show of Coyote Tales' 2023 season. The warm and encouraging crowd welcomed the mildly anxious but willing performers to the spotlight to share their true tales based on the theme, "BUSTED."
