Cities and towns are creations of the State and as such are subject to State regulation that evolves over time. Historically cities and towns have been granted land use authority allowing them to plan and to regulate development within their boundaries through zoning and development ordinances. Ivins City has exercised that privilege. We have developed a comprehensive General Plan that establishes a vision for future development and have adopted zoning and development ordinances consistent with that plan. Our vision recognizes the importance and sensitive nature of our natural environment, and our development ordinances have been drafted to include design requirements that ensure a measure of compatibility with our majestic surroundings.

One can argue that we have either gone too far or not far enough with those regulations depending on your point of view, but when one chooses to live in an incorporated city or town certain individual rights are forfeited for the overall good of the community. It is not my intent to debate the Constitutional validity of that fact but simply to acknowledge it for the sake of this discussion. “That which is best for the community” is decided upon by an elected City Council within a narrow range granted by the State. Once adopted through a rigorous public process, city ordinances supersede in very specific areas the will of individuals who would choose to do otherwise.



Over the last twenty plus years, Ivins City Councils working with consultants and staff have tried to establish a clear vision for our future and to put ordinances in place that support that vision. Once again it is not my intent to debate what we got right or wrong. That is subject to your opinion. It is simply to establish a foundation for that which has been done. Our General Plan focuses heavily on our natural assets and attempts to outline means by which we can preserve them over time as development occurs and the city changes.

Using the General Plan as a guide, our zoning and development ordinances have been adopted and refined over time with that goal in mind while recognizing other State imposed requirements governing development. In our case those regulations have included such things as building height, exterior colors and materials, fencing and lighting. Most certainly not everyone has agreed with them and many have argued against their application in their particular cases, but they have remained in place for a number of years and the look and feel of our city is a direct result of them.

In 2021, the State Legislature passed House Bill 1003 removing the right of cities to regulate these visual components of development except for building height and exterior lighting in one and two family dwellings. That was good news for anyone who wanted to have a white or brightly colored house or an out building not previously allowed, but in my opinion it was a terrible thing for Ivins City. For three decades we have been systematically developing an image and brand for Ivins that was consistent with the reasons most people chose to live here and to attract an appropriate commercial base to sustain the city long term. Our collective appearance has had a lot to do with establishing that brand and as we look at the long term affect it has pretty successfully accomplished both of those goals.

In a recent interview published in the St. George News, I expressed my frustration with HB1003 and other actions the Legislature has taken diminishing our city’s land use authority. My language was more provocative than it needed to be but these were my arguments. Not contesting the right of the State Legislature to do what they did, I nonetheless challenged their motivation for doing it. Just because they had the “right” to do what they did does not make it right for them to have done it. Like the Federal Government overregulating the States, our State Government with its “one size fits all” approach to governance did not do the right thing for Ivins City and other similar communities across the state with these regulations and here’s why.



In our case, just as it is in Springdale, Moab, Park City and several other Utah cities, diminishing our “brand” by removing some of its underpinnings could have serious economic consequences. Our established businesses and those that are currently locating here didn’t come here by accident. They’re here because of what our city has to offer them to successfully operate their businesses, and the image of the city plays an important role in that. In retail it’s all about the number of nearby rooftops and traffic volume no matter the location, but when it comes to hospitality and tourism, it’s all about the character of the place. Since our eventual retail base will for the most part be hospitality related it all boils down to one thing for us: what does Ivins City look and feel like?

Here’s a case in point. When I was elected Mayor, I was convinced that we were going to struggle to attract any future business until we finished off our Historic Township with paved roads, curb and gutter and sidewalks. It was a complicated process but the project was eventually approved by the affected voters and completed.

I remain convinced that neither the Southern Utah Veterans Home nor Rocky Vista University would have located here without that being done, and aside from its obvious practical and safety benefits, that project was all about appearance.

My biggest complaint with the State Legislature has to do with the motivation behind this legislation. Governor Cox declared a housing availability and affordability crisis and has asked the Legislature to come up with “bold solutions” to the problem. For a Legislature dominated in both Houses by individuals with backgrounds in development and real estate, particularly in their leadership, that was an open invitation to get rid of nuisance City approval processes and regulations governing what they could build. Invitation accepted!

HB1003 was sold to the Legislature primarily as a housing affordability measure. Since a gallon of red paint or stucco finish material costs the same as a gallon of blue, that wasn’t even a valid argument but it carried the day nonetheless. And since production builders and real estate developers do not sell properties based on their hard costs but rather on their market value, any dollar saved as a result of improved efficiencies in the approval process or the elimination of design compliance obstacles goes directly into their pockets, not to their sticker shocked buyers. Any City Council Member anywhere in this state is required by statute to disclose a potential conflict of interest if they stand to derive any financial gain from their actions. Perhaps it’s time our Legislators considered that same requirement for themselves.

I want to make it clear that I have great respect for our local State Senators and Representatives. They are caught in a whirlwind every spring with a legislative session that is limited in its time but not in the number of bills it must consider. I do not envy them. I do have some questions for the Legislature however; First, for the sake of ramping up housing production statewide, is it worth damaging the character of cities like ours with your generalized policies after we have created the very environments that people coming here from everywhere else seek to enjoy? Second, couldn’t the time spent working on a bill to remove local land use authority have been better spent developing a bill outlining additional requirements to help cities upgrade their ordinances governing appearance to make the approval process clearer and quicker? And lastly, given your firsthand experience with the heavy handedness of the Federal Government over the State, do you honestly think that blanket legislation by the State over the cities in matters such as these is better than regulations that come from local government closest to the people? Just curious.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Highway 91 Project: This HWY 91 project began early February. Underground utility work and subgrade preparations are mostly complete and asphalt work has begun and will continue through August. Work will continue on the two roundabouts at 400 West and Kwavasa Dr. There have been several weather delays and changes to the scope of the project that will likely have an impact on the final completion date of the project. Information will be provided as the project gets closer to completion.

The project generally entails resurfacing the roadway, adding a center landscape median, adding bike lanes to HWY 91 from 200 East to Kwavasa, adding an 11' wide pedestrian trail on the north side of HWY 91 from 200 East to Fire Lake Park, and the construction of two roundabouts located at 400 West and Kwavasa. There will also be some utility improvements as well as intersection improvements at 200 West and Main Street. Anticipate mild to moderate disruption along HWY 91 continuing until September.

It is anticipated that the roadways and roundabouts will be done in segments. Below are the general segments and the anticipated work timeline:

Road Segment 1 – 200 East to 400 West – February to June (about 55 days)

Road Segment 2 – 400 West Roundabout – June to August (about 40 days)

Road Segment 3 – 400 West to Kwavasa – July to August (about 30 days)

Road Segment 4 – Kwavasa Roundabout – May to July (about 40 days)

A final asphalt overlay of all road segments, between 200 East and Kwavasa, is anticipated to be done in August or September.

The trails are also anticipated to be done in segments, below are the general segments and the anticipated work timeline:

Trail Segment 1 – 200 East to Main Street – April to June (20 days)

Trail Segment 2 – Main Street to 400 West – late April to June (30 days)

Trail Segment 3 – 400 West Roundabout – late April to July (35 days)

Trail Segment 4 – 400 West to Kwavasa – late May to July (30 days)

Trail Segment 5 – Kwavasa to Kayenta Parkway – late July to September (50 days)

Trail Segment 6 – Kayenta Parkway to Fire Lake Park – early July to September (40 days)

This schedule is tentative and subject to change, but more accurate information will be provided each month as the project progresses.

Pressure Irrigation Pipeline Project: It is anticipated that an irrigation pipeline project will begin either late August or early September. A couple sections of pipelines will be installed along sections of Kwavasa (600 West) between Center Street and Old HWY 91. An additional pipeline will be installed along 400 West between 200 South and 400 South. The project timeline is approximately 60 days. Expect only mild disruption along these streets.

WATER WISDOM

Help the City reach its goal to reduce water use by 10% over the next 10 years.

Flood Hazard Mapping

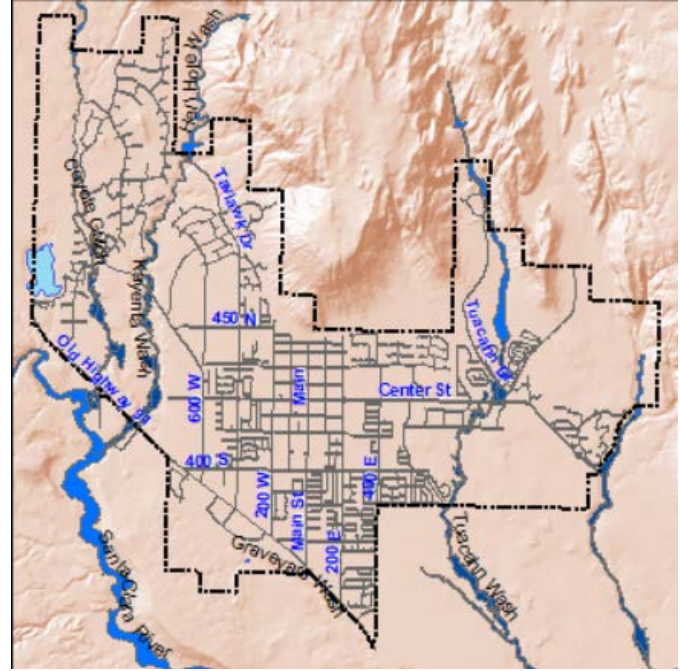
Drainage and flooding are always on my mind this time of year. Even though it is hot and dry right now and some rain would seem like a nice thing, the monsoon season is getting ready to start, so we need to be cautious of potential flooding.

Some of you may or may not be aware that there are flood hazard maps that identify areas in Ivins City that have potentially higher risk of flooding. The map exhibit shown with this article is a small hard to read version of this mapping.

The mapping was produced by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). They are periodically updated from time to time and shows the flooding risk specifically around some of the major drainages that cross the City. It will be best to first explain some basics of how the Flood Insurance Rate Maps work. Flood zones are identified based on a frequency-risk analysis. Most critical to the flood rate map is to identify areas within the 100-year flood zone, which is defined as an area that has 1% annual chance of being

flooded. There are many different types of 100-year flood zone designations but only two apply to Ivins City. The first is Zone A for flood zones in approximate study areas and the other is Zone AE for detailed study areas. Less hazardous flood areas are identified as Zone X and are considered to be areas of minimal to moderate flooding. In Ivins, all areas outside of the Zone A and AE areas are considered to be in a Zone X. In other words, any area in Ivins has a potential for flooding, but for structures located within the 100-year flood zone (Zone A or AE), mortgage lenders are going to require a property owner to purchase flood insurance. Everywhere else the purchase of insurance is optional, although I do recommend it.

The small Ivins City map with the flood zones overlaid included with this article will give you a good idea if you are close to one of these zones. If you think your home might be captured within one of these zones you may want to review the maps more carefully. To see full versions of the map, you can Google the "FEMA Map Service Center" and view the maps online by typing in your street address.

IVINS CITY COUNCIL 2023 NON-PARTISAN MUNICIPAL ELECTION INFORMATION

Ivins City has three (3) City Council positions to be voted on. They are each four (4) year terms.

There are (8) Candidates running for three (3) City Council positions. The Primary Election will narrow the Candidates down to six (6) and those six (6) Candidates will proceed onto the General Election. You may vote for up to three (3) Candidates. It is important to note that if you vote for more than three (3) Candidates, that is considered an overvote and as a result, is a spoiled vote and will not be counted.

The Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, September 5th, 2023*. The General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 21st, 2023*. The Municipal Elections will be Vote-by-Mail and Ivins City Hall will be a Ballot Assistance Center for all Ivins City voting precincts where you may drop off your ballot during regular office hours, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Any in-person voting on Primary and General Election Days will be held at the Vote Center at the Dixie Convention Center located at 1835 Convention Center Dr. St George UT. Polls open at 7am and close at 8pm on these Election Days.

The Vote Center will have an electronic voting machine available to assist voters with sight or mobility issues. An individual with a disability who is not able to vote a manual ballot by mail may obtain information on voting in an accessible manner from the county's website, www.washco.utah.gov/departments/clerk-auditor/election-info or by contacting the county clerk @ 435-986-3399 or send an email to elections@utah.gov.

If you have questions regarding Vote-by-Mail, early voting, when ballots will be mailed, addressing issues or requests, voter registration, or the Special Election for U.S. Congressional District 2, you may contact the Washington County Clerks Office via their website: www.washco.utah.gov/departments/clerk-auditor/election-info or by phone: 435-986-3399.

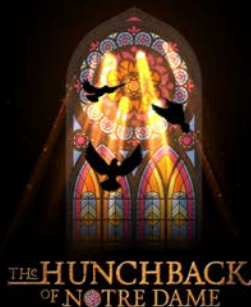
