Meet the Candidates Forums

With the Primary Election now certified, the six successful candidates competing for our three soon-to-be vacant seats on the Ivins City Council have been invited to participate in three upcoming “Meet the Candidates” forums. The first is being sponsored by the St. George Area Chamber of Commerce and will be held on October 11th from 5:30 to 7:30 P.M. at Ivins City Hall. Seating is somewhat limited but the meeting is also being made available for you to participate via Zoom at <https://us02web.zoom.us/j/88479864784>.

A group of community members is sponsoring the last two candidate forums. Their first will be held at Kayenta Center for the Arts on October 26th and their second at Vista School on November 1st. Those forums will be held from 6:30 to 8:00 P.M. Their format will begin with each candidate providing opening statements, followed by about an hour of prepared questions that they will be given in advance, and finally, the last 30 minutes will be reserved for questions from the audience. Zoom options will not be available for these latter two meetings.

Updated General Plan

It has been a monumental task, but the Planning Commission is nearing the finish line on their recommended revisions to the Ivins City General Plan. Before they began their work we held numerous open houses and conducted a successful city wide survey to gather your input and insights. Those efforts provided valuable background for the formal process that is currently underway. The Planning Commission has focused considerable time and effort studying those results, updating antiquated information and analyzing the structure and critical elements of other successful General Plans.



The nearly completed DRAFT of their revised General Plan is now available for your review on the Ivins City website at Ivins.com, click on the “Other Links” tab and scroll to “General Plan Draft (for review).”

The format and content of the revised draft is quite different from our current General Plan so it’s well worth you taking the time to study it and compare it to the current plan to understand the proposed changes. We are now in the midst of the formal adoption process that will allow you to comment during Public Hearings at an upcoming Planning Commission meeting and again at a subsequent City Council meeting. Those dates have not been set so please watch the notices on the City website and elsewhere if you desire to comment.

Talkabout on Open Space

Our next Talkabout will take place on Wednesday, October 18th from 7:00 to 9:00 P.M. at Rocky Vista University and will focus on Open Space. Our recent survey revealed that open space is an important consideration for the future of our community by an overwhelming number of you our residents. The panelists for this Talkabout are experts on the various means of creating, acquiring and preserving open space. They will help us understand what other communities have done in the past, the legal options and issues involved in acquiring open space, what we as a city might be able to do going forward, what resources will be needed to accomplish our survey objective and what are the available means for us to acquire those resources.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Highway 91 Project: The Highway 91 project is nearing completion. Please remember to pay attention to signage and detours for pedestrian use. Once the project is complete the trails will be open for public use, but until then please stay off the trails.

There are a couple sections of trail between Kwavasa and Fire Lake Park that the trail will not be paved with asphalt. The City intends to pave these sections as part of the second phase of construction.

Pressure Irrigation Pipeline Project: This project is anticipated to start at the beginning of October and be completed within 60 days. A couple sections of pipelines will be installed along sections of Kwavasa (600 West) between Center Street and Old Hwy 91. An additional pipeline will be installed along 400 West between 200 South and 400 South. Expect only mild disruption along these streets.



Correction on Bicycle Laws, 2021 Stop-As-Yield Law

Last month in my newsletter article, I wrote that bicycles must follow all the same laws as vehicles including stopping at stop signs. Several alert readers let us know that that is not accurate as of the 2021 Utah Legislature Bill HB 142, also known as the Utah Stop-As-Yield Law which allows cyclists to treat stop signs on roadways as yield signs. Thank you to those who pointed that out.

WATER WISDOM

Outdoor Tip: Adjust your irrigation timers as it cools. In October, water twice per week.

Indoor Tip: Install low-flow faucet aerators, which will save up to 1,000 gallons of water annually per faucet.

Household Hazardous Waste Days - October 14th at the Landfill

What is Household Hazardous Waste?

In our daily lives, we often take for granted the convenience and efficiency that modern products bring to our homes. From cleaning supplies and paints to batteries and electronics, these items enhance our quality of life. However, there's a hidden side to our consumption patterns that often goes unnoticed. It is the the generation of household hazardous waste (HHW). These materials can be harmful to our health, the environment, and even our communities if not disposed of properly. Let's explore the importance of managing HHW responsibly and share some essential tips for safe disposal.



HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE **Continued...**

Understanding Household Hazardous Waste

- Household hazardous waste refers to any discarded product that contains substances potentially harmful to human health and the environment. Common examples include:
- **Paints and Solvents:** Many paints, varnishes, and paint thinners contain volatile organic compounds (VOCs) that can release harmful fumes into the air.
- **Cleaning Products:** Household cleaners may contain corrosive or toxic chemicals that can harm aquatic ecosystems if they enter waterways.
- **Batteries:** Alkaline and rechargeable batteries can leak hazardous materials, including heavy metals like lead and cadmium, which pose serious health and environmental risks.
- **Electronics:** Old electronic devices, such as computers, and cell phones, often contain toxic components like lead, mercury, and brominated flame retardants.
- **Florescent Lightbulbs:** Burned out fluorescent lightbulbs contain mercury.
- **Pesticides and Herbicides:** These chemicals can contaminate soil and water, affecting wildlife and potentially entering the food chain.

Responsible Disposal Tips

Here are some practical steps you can take to ensure the proper disposal of household hazardous waste:

- **Identify HHW:** Familiarize yourself with the types of HHW you use and generate in your household. Pay attention to product labels for disposal instructions. Many products provide guidance on how to handle HHW safely.
- **Reduce Consumption:** Minimize HHW generation by opting for less toxic alternatives and using products efficiently.
- **Proper Storage:** Store HHW in a cool, dry, and well-ventilated area away from children and pets. Use secure containers to prevent leaks.
- **Recycle Where Possible:** Many components of electronic waste and some batteries can be recycled. Best Buy and Staples both have electronics recycling programs. The County Landfill has a recycle program for unused paint, motor oil, hydraulic and transmission fluids, computer towers, printers, laptops, vehicle batteries and rechargeable batteries.
- **Dispose Responsibly:** Never pour HHW down drains or toilets and avoid putting it in the regular trash. Alkaline batteries may go to the landfill, but best practice is to tape the terminals before throwing them away. Never clean out paint supplies in the curb or anywhere that seeps into the ground or runs off into a stream. Water based painting supplies may be cleaned in a sink that connects to the sewer. Oil based painting supplies should be cleaned in a self-contained basin that may be disposed in the landfill once it has dried.
- **Participate in HHW Days at the Landfill:** HHW Days at the Washington County Landfill is coming up soon on October 14, 2023, 8:00 AM to 12:45 PM. The County Landfill is located at 330 N Landfill Road in Washington, Utah. The County will accept the following: aerosol cans, car batteries, fluorescent light bulbs, fuel, herbicides, medical waste, oil, paint, paint thinners, pesticides propane, batteries, and paint supplies.



By responsibly managing household hazardous waste, we can protect our health, preserve our environment, and contribute to a safer and cleaner future for all. Let's make informed choices and take action to safeguard our homes and planet. Thank you for being part of our commitment to a sustainable and healthy community.

METHOD:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit.

Crush the graham crackers until they're small crumbs (I use a bag and mallet)

In a bowl, combine the graham crackers and melted butter using your hand or spatula until it's well mixed.

Grease the sides and bottom a 9" pie pan and press the graham crackers into the base and up the sides. Set aside. Take your time pressing it into place to get a firm crust. In a large bowl, add the sugar and flour and whisk to combine. Add the eggs and whisk to combine. Add the vanilla, buttermilk, melted butter, and salt and whisk to combine. Once the oven is up to temperature, pour the buttermilk mixture into the unbaked prepared pie crust and bake for 50-60 minutes. The center will be set when the pie is done so if you notice the center jiggling at all when you're pulling it out, cook it for another 5 minutes and check again. Remove from the oven and let cool for at least 2 hours before serving.

For the Topping:

Combine cream cheese, sugar, and vanilla in a mixing bowl with a whisk attachment and whisk on medium speed for about 2 minutes until combined. Add the cream and whip on medium speed until the cream reaches soft stiff peaks, about 2 minutes. Keep a close eye though because it will go from perfectly whipped to over-whipped in a matter of seconds. Immediately use or keep refrigerated for up to 2 days until ready to use.

Add fruit of your choosing as a garnish.

2 T flour
3 eggs
½ C butter, melted
1 C buttermilk
2 t vanilla
Pinch of salt

Topping: (optional)

1 tablespoon cream cheese
1 tablespoon granulated sugar
¼ t vanilla
¾ C heavy cream
Fruit as garnish
