Protective Orders

A protective order is an order from the court. The person requesting the order (and the person who would be protected by the order) is called the **petitioner**. The person the order is requested against (and against whom it would be issued) is called the **respondent**.

If the respondent violates a protective order* they can be arrested and charged with a crime.

* A protective order must be served upon the respondent before law enforcement can make an arrest.

The court must find:

- The petitioner has a current reasonable fear of future harm, abuse or domestic violence, or
- Respondent committed or was convicted of: violating the protective order, or a qualifying domestic violence offense after the protective order was issued.

Stalking Injunctions

A civil stalking injunction is a court order that tells the respondent that they may not stalk the petitioner, may not contact or go near the petitioner, and may not go near others who are listed in the injunction.

The respondent directly, indirectly, or through someone else followed, monitored, observed, photographed, surveilled, threatened, communicated to or about the petitioner, or interfered with the petitioner's property using any action, method, device, or means.

The court must find:

- The petitioner has been harassed or repeatedly followed; and
- Respondent made a threat placing the petitioner in fear for their safety or for the safety of family.
