Dry!

That's the one word that best describes our current situation. We're in the midst of one of the driest years on record with no relief in sight. I'm keeping my fingers crossed that we'll receive some springtime rainstorms to compensate for the lack of snowpack, but there are no guarantees that we will even come close to a normal annual accumulation of moisture. Fortunately, our reservoirs are seventy five percent full and capable of getting us through this summer, with sufficient storage for another drought year captured in the sandstone under Sand Hollow Reservoir. Nonetheless, we may be called upon to curtail our use under our Regional Drought Contingency Plan at some point, and as we have witnessed the tragic wildfires burn through tens of thousands of acres in southern California, it behooves us to look carefully at the fuel situation around our houses and neighborhoods and to contemplate how we should prepare for a similar situation.



Our fire crews check our fire hydrants regularly to insure that they are functioning properly and we have the regional water supply available to us to help us suppress a wildfire should one occur. But it is imperative that we exercise an extra measure of caution under these conditions to prevent an accidental ignition. SCI Fire & Rescue is prepared with both the proper equipment and training to deal with wildfires, and we have agreements in place with other regional agencies to respond to a major fire wherever it may occur. All of that planning and preparation is comforting, but as we've seen, under certain conditions it can be nearly impossible to bring a wind driven brush fire under control.

Kayenta Properties has with great foresight built a sprinkler system along its western border to slow down an oncoming fire. I've also witnessed residents pruning back vegetation near their homes across the city, but there's much more that should still be done, especially in a year like this one is shaping up to be. If you have any questions about the vulnerability of your own property, SCI Fire Chief Dan Cazier and his staff are willing to come to your site and offer advice. There is also extensive information available online. What we can do individually we should do, and soon.

On a completely unrelated topic that just happens to tie into the title of this article, I announced at our last City Council work meeting that the Washington County Water Conservancy District released a letter explaining that the results of additional studies and system modeling conducted by Stantec Engineering, the District's internationally recognized consulting firm hired to help them with the design and construction of the proposed Regional Reuse System, that incorporates the most current information available from the regional partners revealed that there may not be a need for two storage reservoirs on the west side of the County. This is due primarily to the conservation efforts of our residents that systematically reduced our demand for culinary grade water, and our recently adopted Landscape Conservation Standards that is currently reducing our need for additional secondary irrigation water. Assuming that these patterns continue into the future, Graveyard Wash Reservoir in Santa Clara may be all that the District needs to store the additional treated water required for use in this area. Postponing the construction of Dry Wash Reservoir perhaps indefinitely comes as hopeful news to many of you who have challenged the wisdom of building it in its current proposed location. There are, however, a number of conditions that must be met for that decision to become permanent including the District locating a water treatment plant in Ivins to provide additional culinary grade water to the west side of the County using Gunlock Reservoir water, and Ivins City advancing additional conservation measures in the future.

If not needed, the District can apply the more than twenty million dollar cost of building Dry Wash Reservoir to the new treatment plant or other components of their Regional Reuse System. And locally, the reduced demand for future irrigation water has allowed us to rethink its proposed city-wide secondary water delivery system, thereby shrinking its scope and cost by perhaps as much as seventy five percent. It is likely the case that future developments will not be required to install secondary water systems in their projects because the irrigation demand simply doesn't justify the redundant plumbing and metering systems. That will allow the City to target public parks, schools and other facilities as well as older developments with duplicate systems already in place to receive the secondary water that the City has committed to incorporate into its water delivery portfolio.

The cost savings to the District and the City brought about by this change in direction is awesome, but perhaps even more exciting is the prospect that the pristine area known as Dry Wash with its beautiful rock formations and scenery might be preserved as open space and perhaps part of a trail network extending from Hell Hole Canyon above Kayenta to the Santa Clara River that would be enjoyed by our residents and countless others long into the future fulfilling Terry Marten's long held vision for that area.

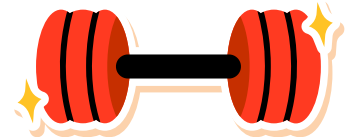
Get Your Sports Physicals

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Old Highway 91 – Phase 2: The second phase of the Old Highway 91 project is expected to begin in early February. This phase includes resurfacing the existing pavement, adding bike lanes to both shoulders, completing unfinished portions of the trail from the first phase, installing a sewer line, and making intersection improvements at Anasazi Road, Kayenta Parkway, and Fire Lake Park. While there will be some lane closures and occasional full closures, disruptions are expected to be mild to moderate overall.

Crack Seal Maintenance Project: This project is already underway and is expected to continue through mid-March. The affected streets and subdivisions include Kwavasa Drive, Taviawk Drive, Center Street (200 E to 600 W), Quail Cove, Tenaya Sands, Tenaya Estates, Silver Sage, Sun Crest West, Santarra Estates, Cliffrose, Window Rock, Padre Canyon Estates, and Heritage Estates. Minor traffic disruptions are anticipated.

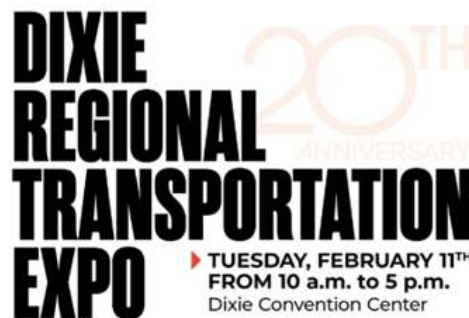

PUBLIC SAFETY

Due to the increasing frequency of illegal electric motorcycle use, we have developed this informational resource to educate parents and users. Our goal is to provide education and raise awareness before taking any enforcement action.

What is an Electric Motorcycle? It is a high-performance electric motorcycle known for its lightweight design and powerful motor. Unlike traditional e-bikes, electric motorcycles can reach speeds of 40-50 mph and are equipped with a dedicated throttle and foot pegs.

Utah Classification and Regulations Utah Code 41-22-2

In Utah, vehicles like the Surrón are classified as electric motorcycles due to their speed and motor power. They do not fit within the state's three-class e-bike system, which limits motor power to 750W and speeds to 28 mph.

Off-Road Use Utah Code Title 41, Chapter 22 - Off-Highway Vehicles

- Registration: To operate an electric motorcycle off-road, you must obtain an Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) title and registration from the Utah Division of Motor Vehicles. This process includes providing proof of ownership and paying applicable fees.
- Trail Access: electric motorcycles are permitted on motorized trails but are prohibited on non-motorized trails and pathways. Their speed and weight can pose safety risks to other trail users.

On-Road Use Utah Code Title 41, Chapter 6a - Traffic Code

- Street Legality: To ride an electric motorcycle on public roads, it must meet Utah's street-legal requirements, including the installation of headlights, taillights, brake lights, turn signals, rearview mirrors, a horn, speedometer, and DOT-approved tires.
- Licensing and Insurance: Once modified to be street-legal, the bike must be registered, and the operator must hold a valid driver's license. Insurance requirements may also apply.

Age Restrictions Utah Code 41-22-30

- Off-Road: Riders under 14 years old may not operate an electric-assisted bicycle with the motor engaged on public property.
- On-Road: Operators must comply with standard licensing age requirements for motor vehicles.

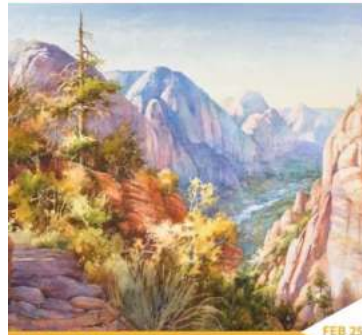

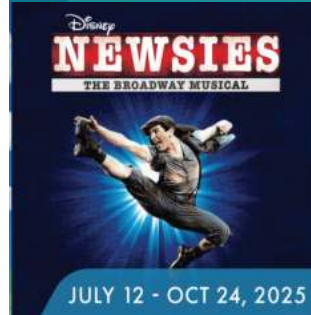
