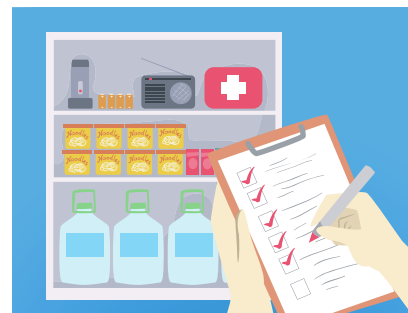

It's hard to say how many tons of litter they've picked up and thrown away, but I'd bet by now it's several. And they're not alone. I see other residents whose names I don't know doing the same thing in other parts of town. What an awesome unheralded service you provide to our community, one that we all either consciously or subconsciously enjoy. Thanks Dale, Donna and others, we needed that!



Tobi Morwood was born and raised in Ivins and has lived here his whole life. Having faced some challenges in his life, Tobi has certainly made the most of it. He tries very hard to do his very best at everything he does. He lives independently and works two jobs, one working for his brother and he has been a faithful custodian at Red Mountain Elementary School since it opened. Tobi has served our community as an Ivins City volunteer firefighter since he was eighteen years old and he takes that responsibility very seriously. Though it's not part of his job description he can be seen

nearly most evenings riding his four-wheeler around town checking to see that the fire station, City Hall, the Police Station, the school and other buildings are securely locked. Tobi is always wearing a smile and has a warm greeting for everyone he meets. Don't tell him this, but I'm going to ask him to be the Grand Marshall at our Heritage Days parade. I hope he says yes. Thanks Tobi, we needed that!

Bill Ingols joined the Ivins Emergency Preparedness Committee early on. As a long-time advocate of emergency preparedness Bill is an expert on most aspects of it and is himself CERT trained. Bill was given the assignment to maintain the nearly eighty disaster boxes distributed throughout the city. That requires him to verify that they are properly stocked, make changes to the contents based on new addresses being added through growth, check to see that the batteries are charged and that the equipment working particularly ahead of a drill. Bill has watched over those boxes like a mother hen and even recognized that the opening mechanisms were too complicated and found a replacement for them online. I have no doubt he will make sure that the boxes are in in good shape for the next statewide "Great Shakeout" exercise coming in April of 2023 and far into the future. If we ever experience a severe natural disaster Bill will be an unsung hero. Thanks Bill, we needed that!



Jenny Johnson has served on the City Council for 6 1/2 years, but that isn't all she's done for Ivins City as a lifelong resident. She served on the Ivins Volunteer Fire Department for over twenty five years and has championed the cause of Fire and EMS Services in Ivins City both before and after her election to the Council. She's currently leading the charge to retain the volunteer program within the Fire Department that is now being run by Santa Clara. In addition to that, Jenny is a member of the Ivins Historical Society and as a Council Member made sure that the monument honoring our original thirteen settler families that stood at the entrance to Ivins City Park that had to be removed during the construction of our new City Hall was restored in its new nearby location. And finally over the last many years Jenny has served on our Heritage Days Committee with her

fellow committee members Marie Bowcut, Marie Hansen, Lydia Nelson, Ruth Roberts and Kallie Johnson working endless hours while preparing months in advance for our one big event held each September.

When the day arrives she nearly drives herself to the point of exhaustion helping with the popular children's activities. Thanks Jenny (& company), we needed that!



Bob Morris currently serves on the Ivins City Planning Commission. He has been a long-time supporter of Scouting and when a quantum shift occurred within that organization eliminating nearly all the local scout troops he took it upon himself to organize a new troop within the city so that interested youth could continue in that program earning their rank advancements and merit badges.

Until recently he has served as the Scout Master and continues on in a supporting role. That's a lot of extra work for a guy who also ran his own electrical business and taught classes at Dixie Technical College. Most recently he signed on to assist Jamy Dahle as an advisor to our newly formed Ivins Youth City Council and will no doubt do an excellent job in that role as well. Thanks Bob, we needed that!

Ivins City History

In celebration of the 100 year settlement of Ivins I am sharing with you some of the stories about the original pioneer families of Ivins. For the next 12 months I will be putting a spotlight on each of the families and their accomplishments. I hope you enjoy reading about them as much as I have. I want to thank Emma Fife who wrote "History of The Santa Clara Bench - Ivins Our Home Beneath the Red Mountain", Kay and Ellen Ence who wrote "Lillie and Milo Ence Pioneer Stalwarts", The Washington County Historical Society, and the website Familysearch.org where I am able to read and learn about all these wonderful pioneers.



The St. George/ Santa Clara Bench Irrigation Company acquired land from the State of Utah after a canal near the old Shem Dam to the Santa Clara Bench was completed in 1918. The original Shem Dam structure was constructed in 1909 as a brush and concrete structure approximately 600 feet upstream

from the current dam location. The brush and concrete dam washed out in the spring of 1932 during a flood. 44-acre plots were set aside for a town site and were surveyed off in one acre lots to be purchased at one hundred dollars per lot. As an incentive, the company agreed to give the first ten families that wanted to move up on the town site a free lot with a water right, only one lot was sold to each person and with the irrigation company gifting of another it created an ideal set up for plenty of space for corrals, chicken coops, hog pens, and sheds. It was arranged that the two lots could be chosen side by side. Leo Reber wrote of the experience "There were twelve families intending on making their homes there, and we were all numbered, and these numbers were placed in a hat, each of us drew out a number and then made our selection."

Thirteen families actually moved onto the Santa Clara Bench townsite between 1922-1926, eleven families with two coming on the same day and two more families that were homesteading outside of the Ivins boundary moved into Ivins to be closer to neighbors.

In November 1926 the Santa Clara Bench was renamed Ivins after Anthony W Ivins, an Apostle for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. He contributed \$100.00 in cash toward the erection of a chapel and promised to send them a bell. This he did and the bell called the people to church and to other meetings for many years. The bell now sits as a monument dedicated to all the pioneers and their hard work.

These first families were all young and excited, and although there was a lot of hard work ahead, there was also a lot of joy and happiness. They got together often and had chicken suppers and candy pulls. All the young families that moved to the Santa Clara Bench were from the town of Santa Clara where they grew up. They were excited about starting a new community to make something out of just sand and weeds like their parents and grandparents did in Santa Clara after immigrating here from Switzerland.

Lula Tobler wrote "There were several young married couples living in Santa Clara who were anxious to branch out and make homes for themselves, and this company was offering a free lot to each new couple that would move up on the new town site. We were among the ones anxious to make this move."



Not all of them were able to make it work in Ivins; some due to circumstances out of their control; weather, disease, and even death, some had to leave and move to be closer to their family. But even so it was these original pioneers of Ivins that taught us the true value of community and being neighborly. They knew they needed to work together to be able to conquer the elements and start this beautiful city under the big red mountain that we all love.

General Plan Update

A general plan is a community's vision. It is the high-level framework against which we define who we want to be. The Planning Commission has been reviewing the General Plan since January.

Our current general plan has two elements.

- A guide for making land-use decisions to provide a comprehensive framework for the physical development in the city; a key tool to make decisions and policies for zoning, budgeting, and capital improvements.
- A reflection of the community's goals and values.

You may have participated in reviewing the zoning map and the land use map.

A periodic General Plan review is necessary to address the inevitability of change. What may have seemed logical, compelling, or desirable yesterday, may now have implications or constraints not initially seen. In any change process, it is prudent to be anchored in core principles against which the change will occur. For Ivins, the General Plan defines the following as these general Principles:

- Environmental protection through innovative urban planning to protect, enhance, and blend development with the unique natural character of the area.
- Housing to reflect a variety of housing needs.
- Economic development through a variety of commercial uses to maintain an economically viable community.
- Agricultural use to preserve open space and aesthetic values of a rural lifestyle and heritage.
- Parks, recreation, and open space to foster neighborhood connection to parks, trails, art, and preservation of native landscapes, wildlife habitat, and natural beauty.
- Public (government) lands to be developed for the best value to the city.
- Transportation planned for future needs to tie the community together and minimize traffic impacts.
- Water conservation.
- Safety.
- Appearance to reflect a small, friendly, and well-maintained community nestled harmoniously in a unique setting.

An additional reason for reviewing the General Plan is to identify where there may be gaps between what we profess and what we do. Things change, we need to look at how the General Plan is currently being interpreted and used. An assessment of any process is standard procedure to optimize how the process carries out its purpose. There are three factors to examine:

- The inherent challenges in making a vision a reality.
- Changing situations – ecological, financial, developmental – to name just a few.
- A more informed understanding of how what we previously crafted has played out.

The Commission is establishing a framework whereby you can add your voice to the General Plan review process. We are currently defining the outreach tools to optimize citizen participation in the review.

In the meantime, please review the General Plan and think about these three questions.

- Are our Guiding Principles still the best ones for our community? Why? Why not?
- As we evolve as a community, are there other things that should be included in the General Plan that are not currently reflected there?
- Are there opportunities for the community to better align our actions with what we profess in the General Plan?

We are fortunate in Ivins to have so many citizens who actively participate in the governing process. This General Plan review will allow us to listen to each other and collectively make wise decisions.

PUBLIC WORKS

Conserve Water and Watch for Floods at the Same Time

It's nature's irony that we must worry about flooding in the middle of a severe drought. Until the recent monsoon storms that came into Ivins this past week, rainfall has been practically absent since December. We average approximately 9.8 inches of rain each year, yet over the past 12 months before the latest storms, our rainfall total was a dismal 5.1 inches.

We were reprieved by the arrival of the monsoons with 1.3 inches that came down on Ivins on Monday, July 25. And now as I write, it looks like we may get some more much appreciated moisture.



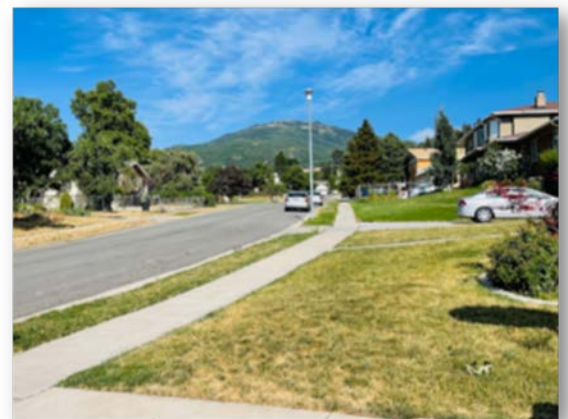

Our storm drain infrastructure is better than it has ever been with all the projects that have been completed over the years, but it is still wise to be cautious and prepared for flooding. Make sure that your property is protected as best as possible, especially if you know that your property is prone to flooding problems.

We do keep filled sandbags and make them available to anyone who requests them. If you are interested, please contact the Public Works office at 634-0689.

However, none of that means we can relax and stop conserving water. We need to continue our efforts to reduce water usage. I recently traveled to Davis County and noticed yellow lawns everywhere. Luckily for us, we haven't yet needed to enforce outdoor irrigation restrictions, but we shouldn't be ashamed to let our lawns grow a few yellow spots in the hottest months of the year. Even better, we should remove lawns that are only ornamental and replace with attractive water efficient landscapes.

As we all know, the monsoons often bring flooding and possible property damage. This last storm was even more intense in other areas regionally and there was some flood damage caused by it. Ivins was spared this time, but it might not be the next time.

Help the City reach its goal to reduce water use by 10% over the next 10 years.

Outdoor Tip: Cover pools to avoid water evaporation. It is not legal to water between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. unless you are on irrigation

Indoor Tip: Add food wastes to your compost pile or dispose in the trash instead of using the garbage disposal

PUBLIC SAFETY

With technology being a part of everyone's daily life, from cell phones, the internet, social media, etc., the victim pool of scams and fraud for Americans has significantly increased over the past few years. This has enabled cyber criminals to drain the savings of persons who are often isolated or lonely. Many of these perpetrators are working their scams from another country, making this type of fraud more difficult to investigate. The goal is to ensure safer interactions online by providing best practices and to help the community not become victims.

Senior Housing Net's 2021 Report on Elder Fraud ranked Utah as the worst state. It performed the worst in the ICS core metric, with the second-worst score for the amount lost to internet fraud per older adult (an average of \$26.67 per older adult in the state). It ranked in the bottom 11 for all other metrics (www.seniorhousingnet.com).

To help educate the residents of Santa Clara and Ivins not to become victims, I will provide the six most common fraud scams seen today below. Hopefully, you will be able to recognize the signs of these scams before you fall victim to them.

Romance Scams:

Romance scams cause higher victim losses to older adults than any other type of fraud. The victim is often using dating sites or social media. The perpetrator will spend weeks or more "grooming" the victim. The perpetrator is an expert at what they do and will seem genuine, caring, and believable. Once the perpetrator believes they have you, they will begin asking for money.



Government Imposter Scams:

Government Imposter scams cause the second-highest loss to older adults. The scammers impersonate police, courts, medical, or IRS authorities and usually create panic to intimate the victims. The scammers will tell the victim they will be charged or arrested if they don't pay. The scammers will make victims panic and request payments via cash, gift cards, Apple Pay, cryptocurrency, wire transfer (Western Union), etc.

Lottery Scams:

The victim has been told via mail, phone, or email they have won a large lottery jackpot. The victim is told if they want to receive the winnings, they must pay taxes or fees. You might be told paying thousands is worth receiving millions. Remember: If you didn't play, you probably didn't win.

Tech Support Scams:

The scammer will claim to be a computer technician and that a virus or malware has been detected on your computer. The victim will be contacted via phone, email, or text with the hope of being granted permission to access the device to fix the problem. If the scammer gains access to the device, the victim can lose everything, including personal information.

Family Emergency Scams:

The scammer will usually impersonate a relative of the victim. The scammer will tell the victim an emergency has happened (i.e., arrested or an accident). The scammer can also claim to be a police officer, attorney, or medical personal dealing with the "relative" that has been arrested or in an accident. The scammer will claim money is needed fast to help with the incident.

Phishing Scams:

Phishing scams are designed to commit identity theft. The scammer will use the information to open new accounts or to access existing accounts. The scam will come in the form of emails that look legitimate. The emails will have links or attachments to click on, which may come from companies or websites that look legitimate.

It was founded in 2010 with the mission of providing support to Ivins Animal Shelter and Adoption Center, now the Santa Clara-Ivins Animal Shelter. In 2006 our shelter became the first no-kill municipal shelter in the state of Utah. Maintaining a no-kill shelter, as opposed to one that euthanizes animals after a set period of time, is more costly because the animals' needs must be met at the shelter until they are reclaimed by their owners, adopted or transferred to an animal rescue organization. 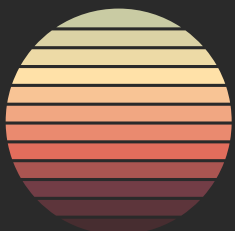
