CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Snow Canyon Parkway & Hamblin Parkway Roundabout

Ivins City's roundabout project at Snow Canyon Parkway and Hamblin Parkway is now underway and has been active for about seven weeks. In February, the contractor completed nearly the entire west side of the roundabout.



Schedule: Construction began mid-January 2026 and remains on track for completion around early-May 2026 (weather and unforeseen conditions may affect timing).

February milestones (west side & east side):

- Paving will be completed on the west side the first week of March
- Traffic will shift to the west side and work will begin on the east side, curb, gutter, paving. The east side should be completed early April.

Traffic impacts: Expect delays. The current traffic control setup will remain in place for the first week of March. The remainder of March, traffic control is expected to shift toward the west side as construction begins on the east portion of the roundabout. Please use alternate routes when possible and allow extra travel time.

The Reserve access: The Reserve construction entrance is currently open and is expected to remain open through the middle of the first week of March. After that, it will likely be closed for approximately 30-40 days. Construction vehicles will need to use the main entrance during that period.

Pedestrian/bike access: The 10-foot multi-use path along Snow Canyon Parkway is currently open on both the east and west sides and is expected to remain open throughout March (though a portion of the trail on the east side might be narrowed). Please continue to follow posted signs and stay alert in the area. Also, it would be helpful and safe for those using the bike lanes in the roadway to exit and use the asphalt-paved trails as an alternative through the construction area.

Work hours: Typical construction hours will be 7:00 AM – 6:00 PM, Monday through Thursday.

Safety reminder: Please slow down and travel through the construction zone at 25 mph. The contractor has reported vehicles traveling too fast through the work zone, creating safety concerns for both workers and the public.

Trail Gap Fill Project

Ivins City will be completing a Trail Gap Fill Project along 200 East to improve pedestrian and bike connectivity.

200 East (100 South to 300 South): The existing 5-foot sidewalk on the west side of 200 East will be replaced with a 10-foot-wide paved asphalt trail. All ADA curb ramps along this route will also be reconstructed. This work will take place in front of Red Mountain Elementary School, and coordination between the school, contractor, and the City is underway. Residents should expect very minor disruptions to pedestrian and vehicle traffic, as well as school bus traffic, during construction.

200 East (800 South to Old Highway 91): Gaps in the trail along this section will be filled with a 10-foot-wide gravel trail using compacted chat material, similar to the trail gap fill project completed along 600 West.

Schedule: Construction began early February and is anticipated to be ongoing through till the end of March and likely into a portion of April, depending on weather and site conditions

HOW YOUR CITY WORKS

Building Department



Today's Topic: Two New Zones to Watch!

Ivins City Building and Zoning recently presented proposals to the City Council that could shape how residential development looks and feels in our community for years to come.

Planned Unit Development – Residential (PUD-R)

One proposal would create a new Planned Unit Development Residential (PUD-R) zone. This type of zoning is designed to encourage more efficient and thoughtful land planning.

A PUD-R zone would allow greater flexibility in how buildings and structures are placed on a property. That flexibility can help preserve important community features such as scenic view corridors, open space, and trail connections.

By allowing homes to be clustered in certain areas, more land can remain open and usable. The result could be residential neighborhoods that feel more attractive, connected, and thoughtfully designed.

New Residential Districts: R-1-3 and R-2-5

Building and Zoning has also introduced the idea of two new residential zoning districts:

- R-1-3 – Single-family homes with a minimum lot size of 3,000 square feet
- R-2-5 – Two-family homes on 5,000 square foot lots

Currently, City regulations do not allow single-family residential lots smaller than 5,000 square feet

Allowing smaller lots could provide more attainable housing options. Because land costs are typically lower on smaller parcels, homes built on 3,000 square-foot lots may be priced lower than those on larger lots. Developers have indicated interest in using this proposed zoning option to expand the range of home choices available to buyers in Ivins.

Heart Health

Heart health is paramount for both seniors and families, significantly impacting overall well-being and longevity. Engaging in regular physical activities like walking, racket sports, or light aerobics can greatly improve cardiovascular health and reduce the risk of heart disease for everyone.

- **Stress:** It's crucial to manage stress through activities such as mindfulness, yoga, or simply spending time with loved ones, as chronic stress can negatively affect heart function.
- **Positivity:** Gratitude journaling may sound like a way to improve mental health, but it is also a way to improve your heart health.
- **Nutrition:** Diet is another key component to preventing heart disease. Incorporating heart-healthy foods like fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and lean proteins into your diet can help maintain optimal heart health. We recommend the Mediterranean diet as a good place to start.
- **Monitoring:** Regular check-ups with healthcare providers, including monitoring blood pressure, cholesterol levels, and other heart-health indicators, can ensure that any issues are detected early and managed effectively.

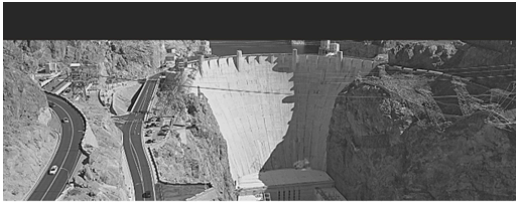

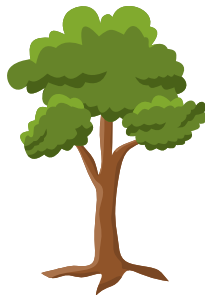

Abandonment Awareness

Bringing your own dog to the shelter and claiming it is a stray is considered abandonment. If you own an animal and are struggling to rehome it or don't know what resources are available, please call your local shelter first. We are here to help.



When an owned animal is dropped off as a "stray," there is no background information available. Shelter staff do not know the animal's behavior, temperament, medical history, or how it interacts with children or other pets. As a result, we must start from the beginning to assess the animal, which can delay placement and increase stress for the pet.

Completing a proper owner surrender form is extremely helpful. The more information we have, the better we can advocate for them.

If you are trying to rehome a pet, there are other options as well. Community resources such as local "Free to a Good Home" pages on Facebook, can connect you directly with potential adopters and may help you avoid the stress of bringing your pet into a shelter environment.

If you need guidance, please reach out, and we're happy to help you explore responsible options





Ben Brooks: A Community Volunteer Who Leads with Skill, Heart, and Humility

When disaster struck Ben Brooks and his family three years ago, their home was destroyed by an e-bike fire. What might have been only a personal tragedy became, for Ben, a powerful reaffirmation of community — and the spark for deeper service. Today Ben stands out in our community, not because he seeks recognition, but because he quietly builds teams, trains others, and steps into the hardest moments with steady competence and compassion.

A unique blend of expertise and empathy

Ben brings an uncommon combination of credentials to volunteer work: a PhD in the biomedical sciences, a position teaching at a medical school, and certification as an EMT. He leverages those strengths in practical, community-focused ways — from organizing triage and mass-casualty training for students and first responders to running vaccine clinics and consulting on public-health efforts. His academic background gives him technical depth; his EMS experience gives him practical calm under pressure. Together they translate into training that's rigorous, realistic, and deeply useful for local responders and medical students alike.

From ham radio to CERT to search-and-rescue

Ben's path into community emergency response was circuitous but deliberate. Connections through the ham radio community and colleagues like Dave Williams opened doors to CERT. Earlier experiences — including living through major wildfires in San Diego and later doing search-and-rescue work in North Dakota with a trained German Shepherd — shaped his sense of urgency and preparedness. Those experiences taught Ben that community resilience depends on preparedness, teamwork, and hands-on training. He's helped bring those lessons home, designing student-run mass-casualty exercises that bring police, fire, medical, and volunteer responders together in coordination and practice.

A trainer who gives more than he asks

What Ben most enjoys is training and mentoring. He lights up describing triage drills and student-led MCI exercises where future clinicians and career responders learn to act together under pressure. Ben emphasizes realistic, student-run events because they prepare responders across the board — and because they cultivate the relationships that make coordinated response possible in real emergencies. He credits much of his own motivation to those relationships: "I get far more out of volunteering than I put in," he says. That humility — combined with a strong belief in team over individual glory — is part of what makes him an ideal community leader.

Turning personal tragedy into community strength

Losing his house and living in an RV during rebuilding was brutal, Ben admits, but it also revealed the best of neighborhood solidarity. Neighbors, students, and local volunteers showed up to lay flooring, run wiring, salvage possessions, and support the family's recovery. That experience — and earlier encounters with wildfire evacuations — is the fuel for Ben's commitment. He knows firsthand how much difference prepared neighbors and coordinated volunteers can make, and he channels that knowledge into recruiting, training, and organizing so others don't feel helpless when a crisis arrives.

An invitation to join — and to learn

Ben is clear-eyed about barriers that keep people from volunteering: intimidation, uncertainty, and fear of being asked to do something beyond their comfort zone. His advice is simple: jump in where you can contribute, expect to learn, and rely on the team. CERT and related efforts need people with many different skills — not just EMTs and radio operators. Ben and his team actively make space for folks to find the right niche, whether it's logistics, neighbor checks, communications, or training support.

A quieter passion: dogs and dedication

Alongside his professional and volunteer accomplishments, Ben's stories of dog handling in search-and-rescue reveal another side of his dedication — long hours of training, deep bonds with canine partners, and the discipline required to be effective in high-stakes searches. It's emblematic of his approach: committed, detail-oriented, and focused on building capable teams.

Why Ben matters to our community

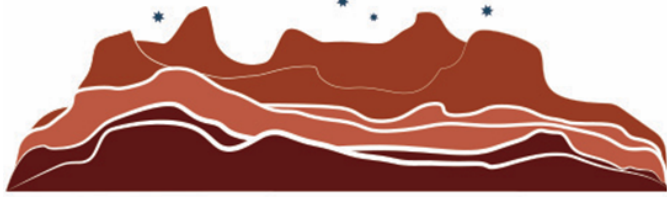
Ben Brooks models what sustained, humble service can look like. He blends professional expertise with practical training, builds relationships across organizations, and turns personal experience into systems that help others. 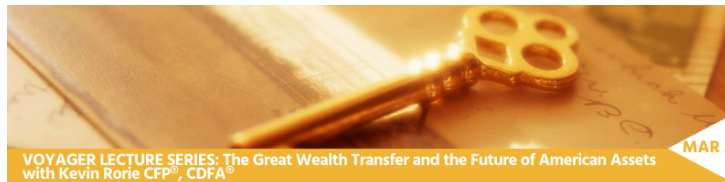


