## Heritage Days - Celebrating a Century of Community

Our annual Heritage Days celebration takes place September 9th and 10th at Ivins City Heritage Park.

Activities begin Friday evening and resume Saturday morning beginning with a parade at 9:00 followed by events and activities in the park that include music and entertainment, games for kids and adults, a variety of booth displays and several food vendors. An art exhibit will be on display in the City Hall Council Chambers and an open house is planned for our newly remodeled SCI Police Station next door. Detailed information covering all activities is available elsewhere in this newsletter. The Grand Marshal for the parade this year is Tobi Morwood, a lifelong resident of Ivins and a thirty year veteran volunteer firefighter. He's the "keeper of the keys" who for as long as I can remember has made his rounds securing all of our city buildings.

Thanks to the Heritage Days Committee for organizing this event. It kicks off a yearlong celebration of our founding as we honor the thirteen pioneer families who homesteaded one acre parcels of land on the Santa Clara Bench that is now Ivins City. Their sacrifices and endless hard work are important threads in the fabric of our community. You'll be able to read an article in the newsletter each month throughout the year written by Cherise Ence Spencer highlighting those early settlers, the struggles they faced and their achievements along the way as they built a new community. Thank you, Cherise.

## National Day of Service and Remembrance

As if we didn't have enough going on Saturday morning September 10th, there are also service opportunities scheduled to coincide with the National Day of Service and Remembrance that was established to transform the anniversary of 9/11 from a day of tragedy into a day of doing good. We hope to foster in our community the spirit of unity and service that arose in the immediate aftermath of the attacks on Sept 11, 2001. The scheduled projects include:

## Grand Reopening of the Center Street Fire Station

On August 10th, we had a ribbon cutting officially reopening our Center Street Fire Station. It had been closed for the better part of a year for remodeling and wasn't originally scheduled to be reopened until 2024. Coverage issues that impacted many of our residents prompted our City Council to request that Santa Clara who manages Fire and EMS Services for both cities move that date forward to the present. It wasn't an easy task but thanks to Mayor Rick Rosenberg, the Santa Clara City Council, their City Manager Brock Jacobsen and Fire Chief Andrew Parker they figured out a way to make that happen. The station is now equipped with a conventional fire engine, a "brush truck" for wild land fires and an ambulance along with other support vehicles. It is staffed 24/7/365 by two full time cross-trained First Responders that can respond to any emergency with backup help from part-time and volunteer personnel. This should come as good news to our residents whose insurance coverage had been impacted by the station closing. It's great to see that facility come back to life.

## There is a Doctor in the House

On August 18th, I was privileged to be part of another grand opening and ribbon cutting as we welcomed Dr. Steven Harmon DO to Ivins. He is the first primary care physician we've had practicing here in nearly ten years. As he launched the Rocky Vista Health Center, he joined Dr. Michael Wagner DDS and the Mountain Land Physical Therapy group as a tenant in the Rocky Vista University Medical Office Building across from the College of Osteopathic Medicine on Center Street. I enjoyed joining with RVU dignitaries, Administrators, Faculty Members and Students as well as our County Commissioners, other invited guests and members of our community for the event. I had previously arranged to be Dr. Harmon's first patient when the open house concluded and I felt like I was in very capable hands. The long range plan is to expand the clinic as the demand for local medical services increases but for now it's nice to have a doctor in the house again

## Let it Rain

The mild, moisture that filled the month of August could not have come at a better time. In addition to the accumulation of nearly two inches of rain over the period it was awesome to be able to turn off the sprinklers and save the water that would have been normally used during those wet weeks. Aside from the damaging floods that accompany monsoonal rains it was sweet to have them return for a season. The cooler temperatures, the wonderful smell that accompanies the rain and watching the soil re-saturate were all welcome relief from our typical July and August weather experience. It hasn't solved all of our water woes but it is certainly cause for celebration.

# Ivins City History

*In celebration of the 100 year settlement of Ivins I am sharing with you some of the stories about the original pioneer families of Ivins. For the next 12 months I will be putting a spotlight on each of the families and their accomplishments. I hope you enjoy reading about them as much as I have. I want to thank Emma Fife who wrote "History of The Santa Clara Bench - Ivins Our Home Beneath the Red Mountain", Kay and Ellen Ence who wrote "Lillie and Milo Ence Pioneer Stalwarts", The Washington County Historical Society, and the website Familysearch.org where I am able to read and learn about all these wonderful pioneers.*



William Alden and Matilda Gray: They were married in June 1915 and they had three boys. They were the first family that moved to Ivins in January 1922 with their family. They moved into a two-room house which Alden and his father had built. Matilda made a loving home for her family, even with extreme desert conditions. Barefoot boys, with sore feet, chased rabbits for food (sometimes a necessity). As the other families came to settle in Ivins, she through neighborliness, concern, and love, helped the new settlers in joining the community and meeting the new challenges they faced.

During a horrible electrical storm, the lightning and thunder made it seem like the little house would be destroyed. They were all upset and frightened. After a seemingly long time with no end to the storm, she prayed with the children for divine protection during the storm. Shortly thereafter, lightning struck with an enormous blast of thunder and the storm ended. Another time a horrendous windstorm with a tornado-like effect crossed their lot and took the chicken coop with the chickens flying in the air and deposited it in the open sage brush some distance away.

In 1923 Alden Gray and Reuben Ence had children ready to go to school, and as the nearest school was in Santa Clara, each morning they put their children on an old gray horse and sent them off to school. You can imagine the worries of these parents, as they saw their children leave in the morning and anxiously waited for the old gray horse to return in the evening. The distance to Santa Clara was about three miles. Sometimes, when it was stormy weather, these children were obligated to stay at home. In the fall of 1924, the government granted Ivins a post office. Alden Gray was the first mail driver. At first he carried it on horseback. There were now six children going to school that winter. The school board gave Mr. Gray a small wage for hauling the students to Santa Clara School. In order to take all the children to school, Mr. Gray bought a second hand Model T Ford.

"Tilda", as she was affectionately called by friends and neighbors, was a guiding light, a teacher who used her talents to produce and direct a stage play using the local residents. The play involved a family with children and their parents. She selected the actors and rehearsed them for opening night. The people of Ivins put on plays to earn money. The play was given in Ivins, and then went on the road in wagons in cold weather to Santa Clara and Washington with good performances and acceptance. Tilda and Alden, like other settlers, lived under harsh conditions but always enjoyed music, plays, dances and parties, and sometimes met with neighbors for social gatherings. Community celebrations were held during holidays throughout the year. Ball games, foot races, other games and dances were always part of the festivities. On Sundays they would hitch up their wagon and go three miles to Santa Clara to Church and have a family dinner. After the other settlers arrived in Ivins they built a little one room chapel; it was finished in 1926. This provided an opportunity for conducting church services and other community activities. After the Church was built, the town held dances and socials in the new building.



Their son Reed remembers "At certain seasons of the year, our food consisted mainly of bread and milk. However in the springtime my father shot cottontail rabbits, which tried to get under the fence and eat our vegetables in the garden. Eating those fried rabbits was a real treat. I remember how I also loved to eat that fried bread dough, which we called pancakes when my Mother made bread. We used to put bacon grease and molasses on these pancakes and it was delicious! We also had a ten-acre farm located on the western edge of town about one mile away. There we raised mostly wheat and alfalfa. After the alfalfa was cut and dried in place, the whole family including my mother would go to the farm in our wagon to rake, pile, load onto the wagon, and bring the hay home. My job was to stomp each pile of hay as my father threw a forkful on the wagon. Stomping compressed the hay so we could haul larger loads."

Matilda wanted to raise a fine, kind and educated family. She became pregnant in 1928 and was due to have a child around the first of the year, after Christmas. A rather violent influenza epidemic struck the area. No one was spared, including Tilda. She recovered as did everyone but it was not a good time for her. The baby, a boy, was stillborn in the last part of January 1929 and Tilda died of complications January 27, 1929 in Ivins. Infection set in since the baby boy was stillborn. It was a very sad day in Ivins. The rest of the mothers living there were much younger and had depended on Tilda to help them. She was, at this time, forty years old. With three boys Alden lived in Ivins for the next eight months.

In October, 1929, Alden was on his way home from a peddling trip, it is thought that on his way up the hill to Ivins he remembered his three boys were still in Santa Clara being watched over when he tried to turn their new International truck around the front wheels went slightly off the road and tumbled down a thirty foot embankment. Unfortunately, tragedy struck this family again and Alden was found dead at the scene. Now orphaned, the three boys went to live with different family members up in the Salt Lake City area and were able to see each other regularly while growing up.



## IN THE KNOW....



NeighborWorks Mountain Country and Sun Country Home Solutions was just awarded a significant grant that is designated to help families that may be struggling to pay their mortgage, rent or utility bills in Utah.

### Desert Tortoise Encounters

There have been several recent reports of desert tortoises that have escaped from Snow Canyon State Park around Ivins. Tortoises become increasingly active during late summer and fall as they emerge from their burrows in search of food and water. In their natural habitats, tortoises should never be touched or approached abruptly to avoid causing them to void their bladder, which can lead to dehydration. However, if a tortoise is in harm's way (such as on a roadway), it is best to get that tortoise to safety as soon as possible. If you encounter a tortoise crossing a road that bisects the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve (such as Tuacahn Drive or Snow Canyon Drive), please follow these guidelines:



- Pull over in a safe place along the roadside.
- Wait for a break in traffic and approach the tortoise. Carefully pick up the tortoise, keeping it upright and low to the ground.
- Walk the tortoise in the direction it was headed and place it over the Reserve fencing. If there is no fencing, walk it a short distance into the desert before setting it down.
- If there is tortoise fencing in the area where the tortoise was found, please take note of the location and report this to the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve so they can inspect the fence for damage. Reserve phone #: (435) 634-5759.

If you ever find a tortoise away from the Reserve, such as in your yard or elsewhere in your neighborhood, please contain the tortoise in a safe place (such as a cardboard box) and report this to the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (UDWR) Urban Wildlife phone number: (435) 680-1461. They will send someone to pick up the tortoise and will release it back into the wild in a safe location.

## PUBLIC WORKS

### CROSS CONNECTIONS. THEY ARE BAD FOR YOUR HEALTH.

As the operator of the Ivins City potable water system, it is our responsibility to create awareness of the dangers of cross-connections. Let's first define it: A cross-connection is an actual or potential connection between a safe drinking water supply and a source of contamination or pollution.

Here are some examples of common cross-connections:

- Your irrigation system or swimming pool fill line is connected to your potable water system without an approved backflow prevention device or vacuum breaker (most common and super dangerous if you use a chemical/fertilizer injection system).
- You have irrigation water and culinary water connected to your irrigation system so that all you have to do is flip a valve to switch from one source to another. This is very dangerous because if you leave a valve open you will feed irrigation water into the potable water pipes.
- You leave your hose in a container or a pool to fill it up. This is okay if the hose is connected to a hose bib with a vacuum breaker.

Here are some examples of real incidents of cross-contaminations (from EPA.gov):

- In 1981, chlordane and heptachlor were backsiphoned through a garden hose submerged in a termite exterminator's tank truck in Pennsylvania. An undisclosed number of illnesses occurred in an apartment complex.
- In 1982 in Illinois, ethylene glycol was backsiphoned from an air conditioning system's water holding tank into a group of dialysis machines, contributing to the death of "several" patients.
- In 1991, an atmospheric vacuum breaker valve intended to protect a cross-connection between the irrigation system and potable system malfunctioned, allowing backflow of irrigation water into the public water system.
- In 1995, pesticides were backsiphoned into a distribution system when an accidental water main cut occurred while a Louisiana farmer was diluting herbicides in a tank. Some people reported nausea, stomach burns and pains, profuse sweating, diarrhea, and shortness of breath.
- In 1995, a business tapped into an irrigation line containing untreated water in Yakima, Washington, without installing a backflow prevention device. This allowed Giardia to contaminate area residences, resulting in 11 verified cases of illness.
- In 1997, a fire truck pump created backpressure on a fire hydrant before the valve was closed, forcing 60 gallons of fire-fighting foam into a system contaminating 40,000 homes.

You should have your backflow devices tested by a certified backflow technician once a year to make sure they are working. They are required to submit the report to the City. Please feel free to contact Public Works, 435-634-0689, if you would like to have a specialist come review your home setup and ensure that your setup is not a cross-connection.

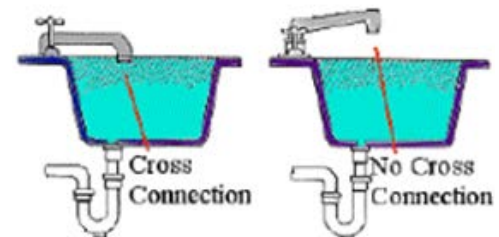
Help the City reach its goal to reduce water use by 10% over the next 10 years.

**Outdoor Tip:** Use a mulching mower that leaves the clippings in the grass; this cools the ground and holds moisture.

**Indoor Tip:** Reuse your towels before sending them to the wash. In most cases, towels can be used 3 or more time before needing to be washed.

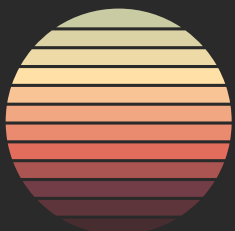
