WHAT'S HAPPENING IN OUR CITY'S BUILDING DEPARTMENT

As Ivins City continues to grow, so does the importance of our Building Department in keeping our community safe, efficient, and beautiful. The Department plays a vital role in reviewing building plans, issuing permits, conducting inspections, and enforcing City codes to ensure that construction projects meet local and State standards.

As the City experiences increased residential and commercial development, the Building Department is focused on key initiatives to keep up with development:

- **Code Updates:** The Building Department is actively reviewing City codes to align with updated State regulations and best practices for safe and sustainable construction.
- **Community Communication:** The Department is striving to improve transparency while working to make it easier for residents to understand permitting processes, scheduling inspections, and staying informed about Code requirements and compliance.

How Residents Can Help

Your input makes a difference! Call the Building Department to report Code issues or ask for clarification. Homeowners and builders can help keep projects on track by submitting complete permit applications, scheduling inspections in advance, and maintaining clear communication with our Department. The City encourages residents to stay informed by attending public meetings and checking the Ivins City website for updates.

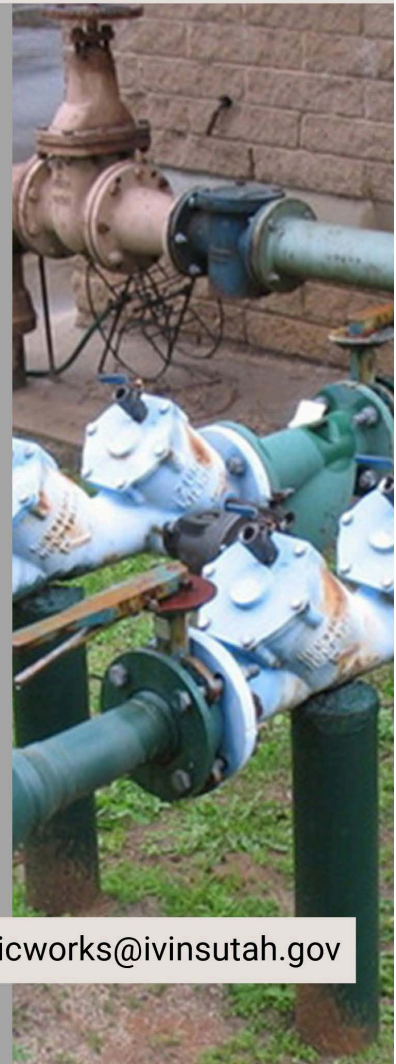
Backflow hazard assessments are coming to commercial entities in Ivins City

Backflow preventers (devices or assemblies) are what keep our drinking water safe. Without them, we would all be at risk of contaminated drinking water. It's the City's job to assess our public drinking water system, as well as commercial entity connections, to ensure our drinking and culinary water remains safe for us to use.

State law requires that hazard assessments (or backflow inspections) be conducted on an annual basis. Utah Administrative Code § R309-105-12.

You might be wondering, well, why am I just hearing about this now? Has Ivins had backflow issues in the past? Ivins City is growing, and aging! As it does so, old connections must be checked regularly to make sure they are operating properly, and keep up with newly installed connections. Ivins has not had issues in the past, because of programs like this! City personnel work hard to meet state code and prevent backflow incidents from happening.

If you are an owner of a commercial entity in Ivins City, **your hazard assessment is coming up!** Please contact Ivins City Public Works to obtain details/requirements for passing.

WHAT IS ADVANCED METERING INFRASTRUCTURE?

Otherwise known as AMI, Ivins City is beginning the next phase of its new water meter upgrade project. This modern system securely sends water-use data digitally to the City, replacing manual and drive-by readings. Residents should benefit from early leak detection, better visibility and tracking of their water use, and easier accessibility to data.

City contractors will be working on replacing meters throughout the city starting in June or July, and should be able to replace all meters throughout the city over the period of 3 to 4 months. Most work will be outside at the meter box, and residents will experience a short 10-15 minute interruption during replacement. They will be locating an external hose bib for some minor water flushing. An email should be sent to you when the contractors are going to be in your area. They will knock on your door before they begin work and should leave you with a FAQ door hanger.

★ Right now, no action is required other than watching for additional information. Once your new meter is installed, the City will provide instructions for setting up your EyeOnWater account.

Usage information will update periodically throughout the each day, rather than only once per month*. The City will benefit from improved reading reliability, faster leak detection, reduced manual workload, and better long-term system management.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why is Ivins City changing meters? To improve accuracy, give the City better operational information, and give residents better access to their own water-use data.

Why is the City using this system? Staff recommended it because it is simpler to deploy, easier for the City to manage long-term, and provides a strong built-in customer portal experience.

Will this new system cost me anything? No, it will not!

Irrigation Tips: Cycle and Soak is best

Have you seen this happen before? You probably have; water running down sidewalks and streets is all too common and very wasteful.

The Washington County Water Conservancy District offers excellent guidance to help avoid over watering. We're sharing these tips as a helpful reminder for everyone.



Grass, plants, trees and shrubs are all healthier when watered deeply and infrequently. Each month throughout the year, water the recommended times per week for best results.

Up to 1 day a week: November – February*

Up to 3 days a week: March – April

Up to 4 days a week: May – August**

Up to 3 days a week: September – October

***Irrigation is typically not needed in December or January. Hand water as needed.**

Sprinklers

The **cycle and soak** method of sprinkler watering on lawns allows water to soak deep into the soil creating healthy roots and eliminating runoff.

- Run **3 cycles** per watering day
- **1 hour** between each cycle
- **5 minutes** for a fixed spray or **10 minutes** for a rotating spray
- Monitor and adjust as needed



Drip Irrigation

Drip **low and slow** to allow plants, trees and shrubs to be watering directly at the root systems using a low pressure for a longer period of time.

Water based on your drip emitter's rate of flow:

- 20 – 40 minutes for high-flow emitters (deliver a steady, light stream of water; up to 20 gallons per hour)
- 30 – 90 minutes for low-flow emitters (deliver bead like droplets; 1-4 gallons per hour)

Because every landscape and irrigation system is different, you may need to adjust this schedule. Variables such as soil, weather, flow rate, and plant type will affect irrigation needs. If a plant appears stressed, check around the root zone to determine if the soil is dry or waterlogged – both conditions can cause plants to exhibit a wilted appearance.

Irrigation Best Practices

- Avoid watering from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. in the summer months
- Adjust sprinkler heads so they don't spray walls, driveways or sidewalks
- Trim around sprinkler heads so lawn doesn't block the water spray
- Use the most efficient types of nozzles and irrigation clocks
- Check the sprinkler system weekly and immediately replace broken or missing parts
- Overwatering and underwatering can cause brown spots; be sure to check water pressure and sprinkler coverage and adjust as needed

Keeping our community safe is a shared responsibility and knowing how and when to report a crime can make all the difference. The Santa Clara-Ivins Police Department (SCIPD) is committed to assisting residents, responding to incidents, and investigating criminal activity. Don't wait until you have all the answers. If something feels off, report what you saw or heard. Even small or incomplete details can help law enforcement piece together the bigger picture. You don't need proof, just share what you know.

Reporting a Crime

If you are a victim of a crime or have information that could assist law enforcement, SCIPD encourages you to reach out at any time, day or night, including weekends. Officers are available to take reports either in person or over the phone.

When to Call 9-1-1

In emergencies, always dial 9-1-1. This should be used when there is immediate danger to people or property, a crime is actively occurring, or a suspect is still on the scene.

Non-Emergency Situations

For incidents that are not in progress and do not pose immediate danger, residents can contact non emergency dispatch at 435-634-5730.

Reporting in Person

Residents may also file a report in person at the SCIPD office, located at 55 N. Main St. in Ivins. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, 435-652-1122.

Reporting by Phone

If you choose to report a crime by phone, an officer will return your call after dispatch gathers your information.



What Happens Next?

After a report is filed, an officer will investigate and document the incident. Depending on the complexity of the case, this process may take time. Once finalized, individuals involved can request a copy of the report through the City of Ivins website (ivinsutah.gov) by submitting a GRAMA request under the Public Safety Department section. Please note that processing these requests may take up to 10 business days and fees may apply.

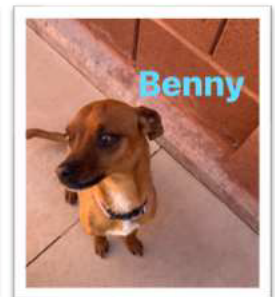
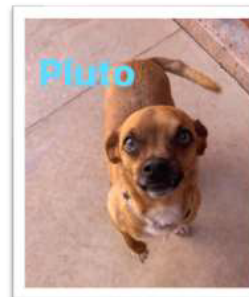

FROM ASHES TO ACTION - A LONELY SET OF MONKEY BARS NO MORE

How Ivins newest civic leaders are building more than just a park.

The Main Street Park was once a well-used neighborhood gathering space, but following a devastating fire in 2022, it is now largely unused. Today, the site is mostly open grass with limited remaining equipment, described by local youth as “a lonely set of monkey bars.”

Fire Chief Dan Cazier said the cause of the fire is unknown; it was thought to have started in the wood chips surrounding the equipment.

What if someone told you that a group of kids wanted to transform this into The Park on Main, a multi-generational gathering space with inclusive play, youth-run markets, a community garden and public art, creating a place to connect?

Well, Ivins has an amazing group of kids that are doing just that!

What sets this project apart is who is leading it. The “Up and Atom” homeschool co-op, led by Lauren Christensen, has been using this space as an outdoor classroom for the past five years. Now those same students are helping shape what it becomes. They are not on the sidelines just asking the city to fix it or requesting a better park- they are part of the process, having become the project managers leading the way!

This project is shovel-ready, with core planning, partnerships, and site coordination already in place, looking for a February 2027 opening.

Early on, students identified simple but important gaps: lack of shade, limited accessibility, and no real space for groups to gather. Their goal became creating a place that works for more people, not just a few. They have focused on creating a place where younger kids can play, teens can spend time, and adults can sit, talk, and be part of the same space.

This has turned into something more than a park project. It is a real-world learning experience. Students are working through the same steps that any community project requires. They are learning how ideas move from concept to reality, and what it takes to work with a city, a budget, and a community.

They’ve spent time with the Parks and Recreation team learning about playground safety requirements, spacing, and accessibility. They’ve looked at equipment options and costs. They’ve started to understand how landscape design works in a place like Ivins, where water use matters. They’ve also been part of outreach, grant work, and conversations with partners. The students have been asking practical questions about how people use space, like where someone can sit while kids play, or how a group can gather without bringing their own tables and supplies. That thinking has shaped the layout in real ways.

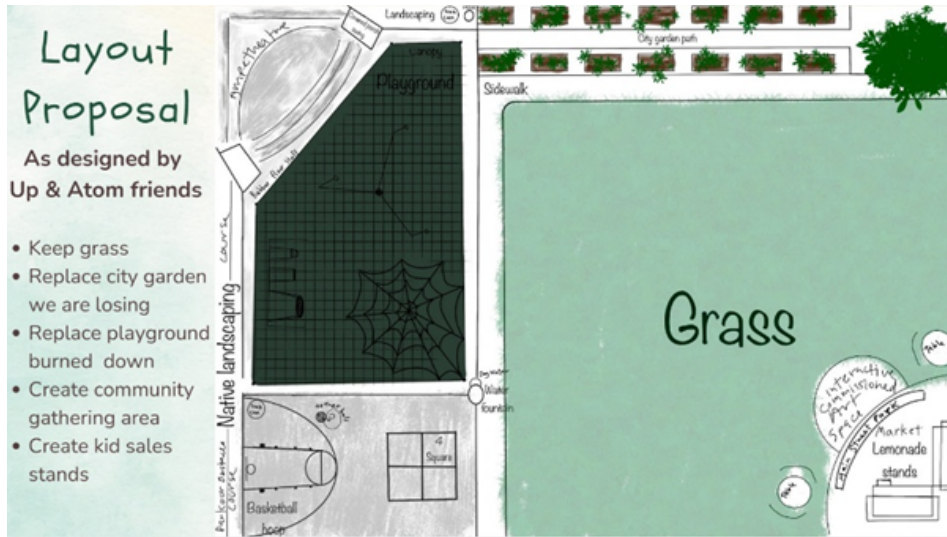
This project will transform the site into a welcoming, multi-use space designed to bring people together. It will include shaded gathering areas, accessible play, small-scale market space, and basic infrastructure such as drinking fountains, electrical access, and water hookups that allow the community to use the space in a practical way.

The park includes four main components:

Zone	Feature
Entrepreneurial	Youth-run businesses, farm stands, and pop-up markets that can provide an opportunity for mentorship between experienced professionals and younger residents.
Unity Art	Interactive public art and a “Unity” Mural in the Arts District to help support performance and community events.
Multigenerational	Shaded amphitheater and garden space for classes and conversation, where knowledge can be shared side by side.
Play & Movement	Inclusive equipment for children of all disabilities, replacing what was lost in the fire, but better.

Connection isn’t added later. It’s built into how the space works. Taken together, these elements create more than a park. They create a place people have a reason to return to.

Along the way, something else happened. Relationships between residents and the local government have strengthened. Students and families are seeing how decisions are made and how priorities are set. That kind of transparency builds trust. It also makes people more likely to stay involved. Some of the students have already expressed interest in continuing their civic involvement, including applying for the Youth Council.



Ivins is changing. As Ivins grows, projects like this ensure our small-town heart stays intact. Residents have been clear that they want to hold on to what makes this place feel connected and personal. Right now, there are limited spaces where that connection can happen naturally.

This first phase is designed to get something meaningful in place quickly. It builds momentum while also setting the stage for longer-term improvements along Main Street.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$100,000. The project will be funded through grant applications and donations. The first grant submission has already been completed, and the Up and Atom kids helped!

Here is the timeline:

- June – July 2026: Final Design and Pre-Construction
- August – October 2026: Site Preparation and Core Construction
- November 2026 – January 2027: Installation and Finishing
- February – March 2027: Activation and Public Launch

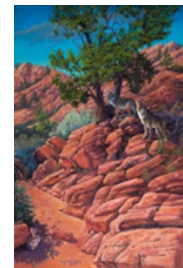
